







Geography of Change

PRADAN is present across the poverty hotbeds in India. Our 69 teams work in the state of Bihar, Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh, Odisha, Rajasthan, West Bengal & Tamil Nadu. These region are characterized by intense poverty, low Human Development Index (HDI), and hilly terrains which are home to the largest concentration of indigenous tribes.









ndia continues to be predominantly rural, and much of it remains underserved. Given the low level of human development of most communities and their continued difficulties in accessing quality education, healthcare, and good governance, this situation is unlikely to change in a hurry, even with the present mood of resurgence in the country. What is needed is the envisioning of a New Rural – empowering communities who will take charge of their own development and not wait for it to trickle down.

On Programs

Beyond the Projects

PRADAN promoted the first SHG by organizing rural women in 1987, which gave the initial impetus to women's SHG movement in India

The SHG approach is now the lynchpin mobilization strategy of the National Rural Livelihood Mission (NRLM) in India

Over 100 million women have been organized for bank linkages and livelihood intervention through state and NGO efforts

PRADAN initiated sectoral institutions like Tasar Development Foundation (TDF) and National Small Holder Poultry Development Trust (NSPDT) work with more than 20,000 farmers making these the largest organized efforts in these sectors

PRADAN's prototype of livelihoods with a comprehensive natural resource management perspective, tasar enterprises and backyard poultry intervention are now salient strategies in various government schemes

PRADAN has also collaborated with Dr. B. R. Ambedkar University Delhi to launch a praxis-based M. Phil program in Development Practice to further mainstream development as a career choice

PRADAN is the National Resources Centre for Livelihood (NRCL), a knowledge and capacity building partner, to National Rural Livelihood Mission (NRLM), the flagship rural development program of the Government of India









Addressing it needs multidimensional, multipronged approaches. Facilitating change in the lives of the communities we work with involves:

Professionals at Grassroots

PRADAN has institutionalized the practice of educated, compassionate professionals working directly with communities at grassroots. Four hundred plus professionals at PRADAN, trained rigorously in development practice, work with rural women in remote villages. Working under challenging conditions, they are perhaps the largest pool of professionals engaged in villages on poverty alleviation (outside the government).



PRADAN has a unique, one-year 'Development Apprenticeship' program to induct, groom and deploy university graduates to work with marginalized communities in remote rural areas.

Mobilizing the most vulnerable through Self-Help Groups (SHGs)

Women from marginalized communities are mobilized into Self-Help Group (SHGs) and other collectives. They come together over common issues and take ownership to resolve them. Through intensive engagement on livelihood, nutrition, grassroots governance, gender and social justice, our professionals facilitate women to visualize the change they want and help them become the change maker. With an enhanced sense of self-worth and self-agency communities through the SHGs not only articulate their own agenda but realize it. They negotiate with relevant stakeholders for their rightful dues, including accessing financial resources provided by government policies.

Leveraging the 1:4:11 Multiplier

For every rupee received from our donors, we mobilize four times the amount from government programs and financial institutions across locations. This leveraged amount is invested in nurturing SHGs, building their organizations, creating community assets and developing and implementing livelihood plans. This investment results in increased prosperity, improved skills, and confidence among communities to take charge of their well-being and development agenda. For every rupee invested on our field teams, Rs 11 of income is generated in communities we work with. Helping the communities achieve this requires carefully nurtured partnerships with other resource organizations.



Collaborating for Reach and Expertise

PRADAN supports Civil Socity Organizations (CSOs) in the regions where they work, and provide technical expertise and training to existing organizations that are looking to build capabilities in its areas of strength as well as partner agencies to enlist their expertise in different domains. We partner with 116 CSOs which helps us integrate issues related to gender, gevernance, nutrition, water, sanitation and hygiene to enrich and expand the depth of work on the ground. Apart from thematic collaborations, PRADAN evolves partnerships with committed grassroots NGOs to:

Build capacity and influence greater number of households: by sharing our learning tools and community institutional models to work with similar disadvantaged communities in other areas

Improve process for implementation: by supporting NGOs to strengthen institutional systems and processes so that they are, effectively and efficiently, able to help impact the lives of marginalised people.

Our collaboration with State, Corporates, Philanthropies, Research and Academic Institutions help enhance the reach and impact of our interventions.


